South Bay High School is a nonpublic school (NPS) which serves the educational needs of adolescents residing in the secure Star View Adolescent Center Community Treatment Facility and provides them with a comprehensive educational assessment, both academic and historic; an appropriate curriculum; and a classroom setting matched to their specific needs and unique abilities. A WASC accredited school, SBHS offers a full curriculum based on Torrance Unified School District; vocational education and WorkAbility program. Recognizing the transient status of the majority of our students, we also strive to prepare students for transfer by providing them with a historically accurate and unified transcript, completed courses in place of partial credits; enhanced academic skills; and inculcation of social skills appropriate to educational success in other settings.

Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2010–11)

Parental and/or family involvement is important and welcomed. Formal avenues to achieve this include IEP meetings; held within 30 days of enrollment and annually, thereafter; parent/family nights; and facility open houses. IX. Student Performance

Standardized Testing and Reporting Program

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including:

- **California Standards Tests (CSTs)**, which include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and nine through eleven.
- **California Modified Assessment (CMA)**, an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards in ELA for grades three through eleven; mathematics for grades three through seven, Algebra I, and Geometry; and science in grades five and eight, and Life Science in grade ten. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations.
- **California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA)** includes ELA and mathematics in grades two through eleven, and science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations.

The assessments under the STAR Program show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. On each of these assessments, student scores are reported as performance levels.
